



# PHRASE IT!



## 3-Part Phrasal Verbs

**To Look up to** - to respect & admire - *I've always looked up to my big brother.*

**To Put up with** - to endure - *How do you put up with that noise?*

**To Live up to** - to fulfil expectations - *The restaurant lived up to its reputation.*

**To Get away with** - to escape blame or punishment - *Even though everyone knew Jack stole the phone, there was no proof so he got away with it.*

**To Look forward to** - to be excited about something in the future - *I'm really looking forward to going on holidays!*

**To Look down on** - to disrespect or disregard - *Dustbin men are often looked down on, but its one of their work is fundamental to keep society functioning.*

## Grammar note!

All of the phrasal verbs listed above take a direct object, which means the structure should be:

**Phrasal Verb + Noun / -ING**
