

Past Simple

Past Tense: The past tense is used to describe actions that have already been completed.

In the context of Christmas, you could talk about what you did last year or describe a particular memory.

- Example: "Last Christmas, I gave you my heart."
- Explanation: This sentence tells us that the action of giving happened last Christmas and is now completed.



Used to

Used To: This expression is used to describe habitual actions in the past that no longer occur in the present. It's a way to reminisce about Christmas traditions that have changed over time.

- Example: "We used to bake cookies for Santa on Christmas Eve."
- **Explanation**: This means that baking cookies for Santa was a recurring event in the past, but it's implied that this doesn't happen anymore.



Would

Would: Similar to "used to," "would" can describe recurring actions in the past; however, "would" often implies that the action was more conditional and less of a habit.

It is generally used for actions that are more dependent on specific circumstances.

- Example: "After opening presents, we would always play board games."
- Explanation: The action of playing board games is conditional on having opened the presents. Unlike "used to," the use of "would" does not necessarily imply that the action no longer happens.
